INFORMATION FOR TUTORS

Inside Information: getting to grips with citizenship is a new course being run through the Education Department. It aims to help inmates become more effective citizens both within the prison community and on their release. Citizenship is central to working with young offenders and prisoners in developing the knowledge, skills and attitudes needed for responsible participation in community life.

Most of the work for this course is based in the classroom. However, a key concept of the course is that inmates understand how they can contribute more effectively within a community. As their immediate community is the prison itself, all staff working with prisoners can become a valuable resource for the course. Students may need to interact with prison staff and they will need to be advised beforehand. A sample letter is provided on p.127 for your information.

The course is constructed in such a way that Citizenship skills, knowledge and understanding, demonstrated before or during imprisonment, can be recognised for national accreditation.

Teachers may invite prison staff to participate in classroom sessions. Requests may also be made, from time to time, for prison staff to become actively involved in witnessing evidence for accreditation.

Your help and support in working with inmates on this new course will be very much appreciated.
